**3 YEAR OLD REPORT** By Lyn De Giorgio: Teacher

It is with great pleasure that I have prepared the Three -Year -Old group annual report for 2019. You can collect a full copy of this report from Kinder at any time, but for now I will just share a few important points about the year.

Our curriculum is guided by the National Early Years Learning Framework, Belong, Being and Becoming, which highlights the importance of educators collaborating with the children, families and communities to build environments and programs that reflect children's interests and cultures. This enables the children to gain a sense of belonging, so they can become confident to explore, take risks and engage in collaborative play, optimising learning and development.

Our planning to achieve these outcomes started from our first encounters on orientation day and interview day. By participating on these days, the sense of security built by attending with family members enabled the children to become familiar with Fiona, myself and the kinder environment. Observations of the children combined with formal and informal conversations with families allowed us to gain an understanding of the interests and needs of each child as families were able to share with us their values and goals for their children.

Throughout the year we have continued to collaborate with families and have used Storypark to share the children's online portfolios. This tool has allowed us to share observations and reflections that have been used to plan, evaluate and improve our curriculum. With families using this tool, they have also been able to participate in the planning and evaluation of their child's learning and development. These practices have aided us to accommodate the children's interests, learning styles and learning dispositions. We aimed to apply intentional teaching that supported their individual needs and development within their understanding of everyday concepts and experiences.





### **3 YEAR OLD REPORT - Continued** By Lyn De Giorgio: Teacher

Some highlights of this year include;

- Using Fuzzy the Clown and his song to provide the children with a sense of security to enhance their wellbeing.
- Using the Hello and Goodbye songs to help the children form a sense of identity within the group and enable the children to become familiar with each other.
- Involving family members through photos displayed in the room, inviting families to join us in a family picnic, encouraging parent involvement during kinder sessions, walk to Kinder day, Father's Day, Mother's Day and more. This helps provide the children with a sense of identity, community and security and gives the children the opportunity to show off their Kinder to their loved ones.
- Reading the The Owl Babies story to settle children with separation anxiety to provide a sense of security, instilling the knowledge that the families will return for them.
- Using puppets to help build the children's resilience and social skills. Tucker the Turtle teaches the children how to regulate their emotions and a toolbox teaching the children how to greet others, understand emotions, think of others, listen, take turns, share and wait. By gaining these skills the children are learning the skills needed to build friendships, engage in collaborative learning and be active, effective community members.
- The children have used the trainset, a car track and the blocks to engage in problem-solving as they design tracks, ramps and roads for their vehicles to move along. By doing so they have explored movement, angles, height and speed. They have also explored road safety and purpose for vehicles as we have added road signs for the children to add to their roads and tracks, and soil, rocks and stones for the children to dig, load and transport.
- Through visits to the Post Office, the library, Seafood on the Yarra, Warrandyte Federation Play Space the children have been provided with a sense of belonging to a wider community.
- The acknowledgement of the Wurrundjeri people as the original custodians of the land in which we play and learn and the learning of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander history, culture, language and values has been ingrained throughout the curriculum, through conversation about Yarning circles, Message Stick, possum cloak, songs in Aboriginal languages and much more.
- International Mud Day, providing the children an opportunity to explore the texture of mud and gain an understanding of the diversit of others through connecting with the earth and stimulating their senses.
- The Kitchen Garden has provided lots of learning as it has provided a tool to reflect on the science of plant development, seasons, temperature, healthy eating and hygiene watering, weeding, removing the snails from the garden and caring for the worms in the worm farm

Fiona and I would like to take this opportunity to thank all our families for entrusting us with your children's care, development and learning. It has been a pleasure watching them develop throughout the year. Our families and the children have contributed greatly to the program and we would not be able to provide the programs we do without their support. We have loved forming relationships with our new families, and extending on ones already established. Your contributions to kinder duty, committees, working bees and fundraising efforts are also truly appreciated. A special thanks to Cat for taking on the position of group representative, she has done a great job, encouraging family participation in our program and the kinder social events, sending out reminders and passing on announcement to our families, organising social outings which have helped to form what I am sure will be lifelong friendships and many other jobs that take a bit of pressure off Fiona and I.

I would like to give huge thanks to our kindergarten president Nat and all the other Committee members, many of whom we sadly say goodbye to this year. These people work tirelessly behind the scenes making sure that our premises are well looked after, our finances are ok, our policies are up to date, the organising of fundraising, including the festival and the float, and the many other administrative jobs including looking after the staff. Without their combined efforts the kinder would not be able to run, we would not be able to provide the children with a high quality-program we aim for. This year we went through an assessment and rating process which was very nerve- racking and stressful. Thank you to the committee for supporting us through this process and rallying up other families to also help us present the kindergarten in a manner that demonstrated to the governing bodies how passionate we are about the quality care and learning we aim to provide for everyone in our kindergarten community. Also a big thank you to Carolyn Camm, our Administration Officer. Carolyn is a great fit with our kindergarten and has been a great administrative support. She goes out of her way to do what she can to support us, nothing is ever too much to ask. I would also like to thank Ronnie and Rhonda for all their support throughout the year. Congratulations to Rhonda on her 20th Year of working at Warrandyte Kindergarten. We are very lucky to have you, your attention to detail, organisation skills, gentle nature, years of experience and eagerness to learn is such an asset to our kindergarten. Rhonda has been a great support making herself available to relieve for Fiona when needed. Relieving staff with other familiar staff members is very important to the children's well-being, especially in three-year-old kindergarten. I feel one of the biggest assets to our kindergarten is the way our staff works together as a team. Rhonda has also followed the Three-year-old children's learning on Storypark. She has shared her ideas with us to support the children's learning and has gained an understanding of the children which not only assisted when relieving Fiona but will also provide continuity for the following year.

I have been working alongside Ronnie for coming on fifteen years now and in this time she has always been available to mentor me, she is always very generous in sharing her knowledge and experience. In the last few years Ronnie has taken on an official mentor role whilst I researched and completed an Inquiry project in order to achieve full registration with the Victorian Institute of Teaching. With her help this process was completed and approved in November this year. To achieve this, it meant Ronnie giving up many hours of her own time and I am so grateful for the support she has provided. Ronnie also suggested I make contact with Michelle Hughes, a Warrandyte resident and teacher at Eltham South Kindergarten, to help me complete my Inquiry and to sit on the review panel that was required to review the assessment task I was required to complete to gain full registration. My contact with Michelle not only provided me with a panel member but she was also able to extend my teaching network by introducing me to Justine Wickham, another teacher who was able to support my learning. Therefore, I also need to extend my thanks to Michelle Hughes and Justine Wickham for all their support.

Last but not least, a big thank you to Fiona for all her support. Although Fiona and I have known each other for many years, first in a parent and educator relationship and during her time as an additional assistant working with our Four-year-old children, this was our first year working together and it has been an absolute pleasure. Fiona is a qualified teacher and has valuable experience gained whilst working with Connections, an agency that supports children who require additional assistance. Fiona has been an asset to our program sharing her knowledge, techniques and ideas. Her gentle, caring nature has helped her build nurturing relationships with the children which contributes to their sense of security. Fiona has a good insight to the children's dispositions, learning and development which she uses to extend the children's learning. I feel we have worked well as a team we have been able to support each other, sharing our knowledge, thoughts and ideas reflecting on the children's learning and development as well as our own practices. I am looking forward to another exciting year working alongside Fiona next year.

#### **4 YEAR OLD GROUP REPORT** By Ronnie Pedersen: Teacher, Nominated Supervisor and Educational Leader

I had much pleasure in preparing the Annual Report for Four Year Old Group attending Warrandyte Kindergarten in 2019. Feel free to collect a copy of this report from the Kinder. I will share some information from this here with you.

This group of children, as has all groups at any centre, has a diverse range of personalities, skills, abilities, and interests. There are quite strong dynamics within the group, and we therefore constantly reinforce the concept and understanding of the rights and responsibilities that are necessary for all children to have an equal and active participation within our group. Co-operating with others, and negotiating roles and relationships in group play and experiences, is an ongoing process, needing to be modelled, scaffolded, and reinforced constantly. The children are learning life-long skills that will stand them in good stead in their future.

Child studies, brain research, and early childhood education theories are constantly and rapidly evolving .... "education involves change", and so we too, as educators, must encompass these changes. We are committed to having high expectations and equity for each child (NQS Principle 3).....really encouraging children to become more resilient, better problem solvers, and independent learners... they are becoming active participants and decision makers. Children are competent and capable learners. This "opens up possibilities for educators to move beyond preconceived expectations about what children can do and learn." (EYLF p.9)

As we embrace the Victoria Learning and Development Framework, we are assisting the children to scaffold their own learning process to a certain degree. Through **intentional teaching**, **sustained shared thinking**, **co-construction of learning**, and our **observations and reflective practice** of where they are at, we are able to provide the children with rich stimuli with which they can discover new relationships with their peers, with adults, with their environment, and with materials and objects.

This approach has certainly brought us all some exciting adventures, because when you let the children build on their own learning (children's agency), it is like a roller coaster, where you are never really sure which way it will turn! It creates an environment of possibilities and wonder – which can be a bit scarey for Educators, as we are being constantly challenged by the children's ideas! It is a well-researched fact that children learn best when they are **engaged**, so it is better to wait for that "teachable moment" when - in their own time -the children show an interest. This proves to be a far more valuable learning situation.....it encompasses 'best practice". Our work with the children never becomes 'boring'!!

Children learn about life through play. Sometimes it is easy, sometimes it is not. They learn to increasingly cooperate and work collaboratively with others, whilst beginning to initiate negotiating and sharing behaviours. They show interest in other children and being part of a group and become engaged in and contribute to shared play experiences. Whilst sometimes it can be confronting, they also begin to express a wide range of emotions, thoughts and views constructively. They are learning to empathise with and express concern for others, as well as displaying awareness of and respect for others' perspectives.



All children are learning to cooperate with others and negotiate roles and relationships in play episodes and group experiences, whilst being able to express an opinion in matters that affect them. The children learn to understand different ways of contributing through play and project and listen to others' ideas and respect different ways of being and doing. They are beginning to learn the importance of practising inclusive ways of achieving coexistence. This is a long term goal for all children!! (and all adults in the world as well!!..so let's try and get it right at the early childhood level and we will have a better place to live!!)

Some hightlights from this year include;

- Excitement of the Warrandyte Village Festival, creating hats and shakers and other adornments for our 'Float.
- Supporting children's understanding of reconciliation week through watching Auntie Carolyn Briggs do a 'Welcome to Country' and exploring Indigenous symbols in the Uniting Church garden.
- The children enjoy spending a great proportion of their time outdoors, using the natural environment to extend on their learning through exploring, problem solving, predicting, and hypothesizing.
- Going on regular outings in our local area are also so valuable in allowing the children to actually focus and appreciate what Nature has provided for us. The children have developed an increasing knowledge of, and respect for, our natural and constructed environments.
- Through the kitchen garden the children are gaining first-hand knowledge and practice of environmental and sustainability practices, as well as growing, harvesting, cooking and eating their own produce. We have made dried beetroot chips, cauliflower nuggets, spinach damper, lemon slice, vegetable soup, amongst other yummy goodies.
- A wide variety of learning opportunities through visits from
  - o Living Safely With Dogs
  - o Warrandyte Primary School students showing their learning in electric vehicles
  - Hot Shots Tennis skills workshop
  - Dinosaur Diggers presentation, leading to months of finding fossils and gemstones in our digging patch and sandpit!
  - Xavier from Wildlife Exposures hands-on teaching the children about Wildlife.
  - o Attending "Peter and the Wolf" ballet





We are extremely lucky to have such a diverse and very <u>experienced staff</u> that creates exciting programs in collaboration with your children:-

Lynette De Giorgio (3year old Teacher) has an extremely nurturing and passionate advocacy of children, and she extends this willingly with all of the families as well. She is always constantly thinking of ways to support or extend the children's learning. This is a sign of a great teacher! Lyn has also achieved another milestone this year, in the gaining of her full teaching registration. This is not an easy task, as when Lyn graduated from Uni, she was then termed a Proficient Teacher. After undergoing a further extensive Inquiry Project, presenting this then to a Recommendation Panel, she had to wait until our Mentoring report was accepted by VIT, who then reassigned her validation to "Registered Teacher".

Thank you also to Lyn who relieved for me when my elderly Mother was taken to hospital emergency several times earlier this year, and then on the death of Mum at the end of first term. I greatly appreciate you stepping in quickly to help Rhonda.

My lovely Co-Educators Rhonda Fitzpatrick, and Fiona Spring have been 'invaluable', as always, this year. Rhonda's gentleness is a magnet to children who need additional nurturing, and her efficiency keeps me 'on track' when I sometimes get excited or distracted by other issues. All staff bow down to her care of the appearance of the learning environment! Fiona has a Diploma in Teaching, and has an ability to understand the children's needs and to be able to scaffold their learning in a very positive manner. She also has a great flair for encouraging and extending on the children's play outside.

Rhonda underwent knee replacement surgery earlier in the year, and Fiona stepped in to relieve whilst she convalesced. Rhonda is going to undergo further surgery on her other knee at the end of this year, which will entail Fiona relieving for her again. This will be ongoing into the start of next year as well as Rhonda convalesces.

All of our Educators have very warm natures to which the children respond willingly, and are an intrinsic part of our very close 'team'. As a team we contribute critical reflections and evaluations of the children at play, as well as of the indoor and outdoor environment. These different perspectives give a more holistic picture of the children, a greater depth of understanding of a child, and hence enables me to extend or modify our planning, creating a much richer program for them. Robust discussions ensure that all views are listened to, and decisions made on these.

Having another group sharing the play environment creates very extensive learning as we all share ideas and provocations from learning/interest centres set up that may not perhaps have evolved from our own group. Thank you for letting us share!

All staff had spent a considerable amount of extra time in preparing our QIP, in preparation for our 3 year (which was actually 4 ½ years!) Assessment and Rating visit. Our folder of Evidence was quite extensive and explained how we felt that our practices are exceeding. All staff participated in this process...and all gave freely of their time. This has been an extremely stressful and tiring process for all! They are to be highly commended.



As Mandatory Reporting has become a legal requirement now for all Early Childhood Educators, attendance at Professional Development sessions have been necessary to keep up to date with the latest information. Another new legal requirement brought in early this year by the Commission for Children and Young People - Reportable Conduct Scheme – was also another stage in defining the legality and responsibility of our profession. This information was disseminated to all staff and committee members.

Another Professional Development day which greatly influenced (and is influencing) our program was "Embedding Indigenous Perspectives in the Early Childhood Curriculum", presented by Jessica Staines (Koorie Curriculum). This was enlightening and not as difficult as it sounds! It was basically all about using our environment, and Indigenous understandings, in ways that are incorporated across all facets of our program. We will be extending on this more in the coming years.

All staff have been extremely interested in building on their Professional Development in the area of Sensory Processing and Self-Regulation. This is an area that influences children's behaviour and development, and with which we have shown interest in the past several years after having had assistance from Paediatric Occupational Therapists in guiding some of our our practices.

Our <u>Committee of Management</u> have done a remarkable job, dealing with all matters both professionally and efficiently. They have always made themselves available, and given up a great deal of family time, whenever we have had need of them. Thank you most sincerely.

I must thank and congratulate our Committee Executive – Nat. Mander, Susan Stoner, and Renee Campbell. . It is always comforting to know that there are people who are prepared to follow through with the many Departmental and Kinder issues (some of which sometimes appear insurmountable). Along with the rest of the Committee, you have all had to make some big decisions this year. As volunteers, you have spent numerous hours trying to find the right solution, and we have so appreciated this. We will <u>all</u> have to make adjustments to be able to make these changes as seamless as possible, and hope that they will form the basis of a more sustainable option for our Kinder. in the future.

Dealing with the repainting of the Kinder over the Christmas holidays, and Council's changing of our Taroona Avenue boundary by resituating our fenceline, has caused a huge amount of extra work, co-ordination, and effort. We appreciate the amount of time you have all given to this to make our work and play environment safe, clean, tidy, and inviting.

Another team mate, Carolyn Camm, our Administration and Compliance Officer, has been such a great support to us all, and contactable at all times. You could always be depended on to explore any avenue to find answers for us. Thank you!

Thank you Michaela Collins for undertaking grant submissions to ...Bendigo Bank, Landcare, and several other grants. You are greatly appreciated, because we know how much effort and commitment goes into applying for grants. And thank you for organizing our working bees, purchasing our new scramble net...and many other things!



Our amazing hardworking Fundraising Team, headed by Trish Canny, have been able to provide us with the funds to purchase some of the great equipment and resources that enrich our learning environment. WOW!!!! To the wonderful night presented to us at the Comedy For A Cause night that Trish and her amazing hard-working team gave us. It was such a great night and the childrens' artwork looked stunning on the wall. Keeping up to date educational resources are conducive to what makes our Kinder fantastic! Getting a free breakfast as part of the Market duty every month is really fun to be a part of, as money raised from this effort is also for the benefit of the children. (Thanks Marissa)

Thanks to Lisa for her mail sorting expertise, and also for our very professional looking Possum Post...keeping families informed. Thank you for all the time and effort you put into it, and the constant reminders to everyone for their timely contributions.




### Do you need some more uniform for next year?



Royal Life Saving NSW – Preschool Water Safety Initiative

### Preschool Water Safety Initiative

Drowning is the leading cause of preventable death in children under the age of five in Australia. More than half of the fatalities in this age group occur in home swimming pools. For every toddler drowning death another ten children are admitted to hospital as a result of non-fatal drowning, many of whom will suffer lifelong consequences.

In response to these worrying figures, Royal Life Saving NSW have developed a suite of educational resources designed for children aged 3-5, to help teach vital water safety messages. The resources include an animated story and a variety of activity sheets.

**RECIPE OF THE MONTH** Shared by Ronnie Pederson

### **Italian Flat Bread**

Our four year old group loved making and eating this Stephanie Alexander flat bread!

#### Ingredients

1/2 tsp salt

1/2 cup lukewarm water

1 tbsp extra virgin olive oil 250g plain flour, plus extra for rolling

#### Method

Dissolve the salt in the warm water and add the oil.

Place flour in the bowl of an electric mixer or a food processor and with motor running gradually add the water. Keep mixing until dough looks smooth.

Tip dough into a dry bowl, cover with a dry cloth and leave for 30 minutes.

Break off small pieces of dough about the size of a small egg.

Preheat a heavy-based frying pan on the stove (even better if you have two pans).



Dust work bench with flour and roll each ball of dough very thinly. As each ball is rolled slap it into the hot frying pan. Cook for about 3 minutes. The dough will bubble and puff a little. Flip the flatbread to cook the other side. The cooked side will have brown spots and blisters. After 2-3 minutes remove flatbread and keep warm in a tea towel. Repeat.

### **Important Information**

#### **Working with Children Checks**

Warrandyte Kindergarten is very fortunate to have a large number of friends and family volunteer to help us with our activities at the kindergarten, including help during our kindergarten sessions. This involvement is something that we very much value as part of our kindergarten. However, more helpers are always greatly appreciated!

All of our helpers require a Working with Children Check card. If you do not have a card, it is a very easy process that is confidential and free.

Step 1: Complete an online application form at www.workingwithchildren.vic.gov.au.

Step 2: Finalise your application at an Australia Post outlet. This will include presenting one acceptable proof of identity document such as a driver's licence or passport. Australia Post will take your photo for the card free of charge.
